Course Description

An introduction to the systemic study of human cognition, emotion, and behavior with an emphasis on the scientific method. Fundamentals of behavior, learning, conditioning, development, cognitive processes, perception, emotion, personality, and psychopathology are among the content areas studied. Particular emphasis is placed on the use of the scientific method for the study of human nature.

Undergraduate Core Curriculum

As with all courses fulfilling the Community and Identity Foundational Area of Knowledge, this course is designed so you will gain a greater understanding of yourself and the communities in which you live and work, and how identity is formed through the interaction of the individual and larger society.

Course Outcomes

Students successfully completing the course will demonstrate a general understanding of the knowledge established in the above areas, as well as the methods used by psychologists to acquire that knowledge.

Course Objectives:

This course intentionally addresses learning outcomes common to all courses fulfilling the Community and Identity Foundational Area of Knowledge.

Specifically, throughout the course, topics related to developmental, abnormal, and cognitive psychology will explore dimensions of human experience with regard to perceptions of self. In addition, social psychology content will help students understand how individuals interact to form communities and social structures.

Attendance & Participation (100 points)

You are expected to attend every class period and attendance will be taken daily. There are 23 non-exam class periods during the semester. Each class will be worth 5 points, which you will earn by attending class, staying alert, participating in class discussions, and completing in-class assignments and activities. You are able to miss 3 class periods (**excused or unexcused**) without penalty. If you miss class more than three times for excused absences (serious illness, family emergency, approved school activities, jury duty, military service, a religious obligation), please talk to me. If you are absent, it is your responsibility to get notes and announcements from other students.

NOTE: If you have two consecutive unexcused absences, I am required to inform the college.

Reading Quizzes (180 points)

At the start of each new chapter, there will be a reading quiz at the beginning of class. Each quiz will be worth 15 points. The purpose of these quizzes is to highlight important topics from the chapters, check understanding, and reward those who keep up with the reading. There will be 15 total quizzes during the semester, however, I will drop your lowest 3 quiz scores. You must be present to take the quiz and I will not offer make-up quizzes. If you are absent for a quiz, you will receive a 0, which can be counted as one of your lowest 3 quiz scores. If you miss more than 3 quizzes for an excused absence, please talk to me.

Exams (800 points)

There will be 4 exams, each worth 200 points. The exams will cover both reading and lecture content, including any supplementary material, such as articles and videos for the topic. Reading material may be on the test even if it is not covered in lecture, and lecture material may be on the test even if it is not covered in the reading. Makeup exams are only offered to students who miss class for an excused absence. If you are going to miss an exam, notify me ahead of time – I will not offer makeup exams for students who notify me the day of the exam.

Group Project (200 points)

At the end of the semester you will be required to complete a group project. More information regarding the group project will be provided after the second exam.
